Personal Highlights:

- 1. Honoured to be selected to visit Harvard School of Business in June 2024, as one of 20 leaders in Canada.
 - 2. MGBHLM Co-hosted the FSIN Healing Gathering. The largest attended healing gathering to date.
 - 3. In It 2 Win It invited and won the Calgary Stampede, and broke the track record.

This is a reflection of true horsemanship and pride for our Nation!

Community Highlights:

Elders Meetings: I want to thank and acknowledge the Elders and Knowledge keepers for their guidance and direction they provided leading up to the completion of the MGBHLM Treaty Agricultural Benefits Agreement. In the coming weeks we will be presenting the agreement at scheduled sites. Seeking results on the Vote on December 13th.

MGBHLM Project Management Team: on-going multi-million dollar projects are in progress within the Nation.

All 100% funded by Indigenous Services Canada.

- a) Waste Transfer Station;
- b) Water Treatment Plant Upgrades;
 - c) Expansion of the Lagoon;
- d) 45 lot Sub-division approved: Spring 2025 tender to go out.
 - e) School renovations
 - f) Fire Hall under construction. Good Job Project Team!

Election Law: Referendum vote for the MGBHLM Election law did not pass ratification. We will re-evaluate the Election law plan in 2025. This is part of MGBHLM Self-determination and has taken 10 years of work to get this far. We can't give up!

Governance: MGBHLM Finance and Band staff have worked towards strengthening our financial systems. We soon will be recognized as one of the four First Nations in Saskatchewan with the "Financial Management Systems Certification" – recognizing a nation for good governance and financial practices.

8-plex Fire and Emergency housing: this past summer in August, the eight families impacted by the 8-Plex fire were able to move into their homes.

Economic Development: MNP is working with the Nation addressing the concerns raised by the auditor.

In closing, MGBHLM has begun negotiating with the federal government on a Regional Education Agreement to enhance and support our teaching staff and provide the best education opportunities for our children. On-going consultation will resume, and your input is needed. Stand by for community meetings.

INDIAN REGISTRY ADMINISTRATOR

Indian Registry days are Tuesdays & Thursdays.

Registration for Indian Status for children and 16+.

Parents/Guardians please ensure that you have child/children's birth certificate and that both parents are on the birth certificate. (Long form)

Bring two pieces of Identification card for applying parent, not the child. (child just needs the Birth certificate).

Steps with processing application.

- 1. Complete registration application form and the registar will submit the original form (signed by both parents) along with the copies of identification from applying parent and copied birth certificate for the child/children for processing.
- 2. Await correspondence from INAC regarding application status, once the registration is complete, INAC will send you a letter of confirmation of registration.
 - The Nation is not accepting band transfers till further notice.
 - Status card option to have the 5 year or 10-year card.
 - Must bring 2 pieces of identification.
 - Applicants that are 16 years or older must sign their own applications.
 - Applicants between ages 12-16 have the option of a parent or legal guardian signing for them.
 - Applicants under 12 must have their parents or legal guardian sign the application.
 - Person can only carry one Treaty Card at any given time.
 - Only 2 cards can be made for one person for one year.
 - Fees for cards are no charge to MGBHLM members, there is a \$10 fee for non-band members.

It is important to evaluate each resource so that it can be useful.


maskihkiy - pežúda - medicine

MGBHLMFN Public works department will ensure that all employees have support training, equipment, technology and procedures that will enable them to proactively manage the hazards they face in the workplace.

It sure, was a busy spring and summer preparing for the community events.

We have a new garbage truck with side mount load up system with big black durable plastic bins, we also have a new fire truck and another fire truck.

We are currently working on the new waste transfer station with ISC.

The current one will be decommissioning.

Delivered black garbage bins to every house.

We prepared the new Sundance grounds with a road and cleared up the grounds.

We prepared the Pow wow grounds, grass cutting and road maintenance.

We prepared the Healing Gathering grass cutting and road maintenance.

We cleaned up and mowed the side ditches.

Cleaning maintenance of all community buildings grass cutting picking up garbage.

Community service for graveyards preparation.

Preparing for the maintenance of the grounds cutting grass at the sports grounds.

Preparing the grounds delivery of water and cutting grass at the Md bog area.

New project with the fire hall.

We will be picking up the old wooden garbage bins and taking them to the dump

HOUSING

13 of the 15 new houses are on the Nation with 2 more yet to come.

Renovations are underway when we get the requests, and working within our budgets.

The Tenant Housing Policy is being drafted. We had meetings with membership on October 28th & 29th 2024 at the school and Band Hall. About 40 people attended and had shared their input.

We currently are working on funding for the new subdivision. This construction will start spring of 2025.

This new subdivision with have room for 60 new lots.

FIRST NATIONS REPRESENTATIVE

Good day Mosquito Grizzly Bears Head Lean Man First Nation Band Members!

My name is Denise Spyglass, and I am the First Nations Representative. I took on this position in November of 2022.

The purpose of the First Nation Representative is to be the contact between a First Nation and the Child and Family Services providers as set out in the Provincial, Territorial and Federal child and Family Services laws.

Our office will also build and maintain meaningful cultural family and community connections for First Nations children youth and families who are involved with child and Family Services.

It is our hope that we will be able to reunify and repatriate First Nations children and youth in care with their family and First Nation.

We will support First Nations youth and adults with post majority care. (those who are aging out or about to age out).

We will support First Nations youth and young adults with post majority care participating in child and Family Services administration and court proceedings.

We will help families access prevention supports.

We will be a support to families who are dealing with child and Family Services agencies and help families to be able to return children who are in care in a timely manner.

My office has been moved to the Ridge since the end of October and I can be reached if you are requiring assistance with child and Family Services matters at 306-407-0349. I work Monday to Friday from 9:00 AM to 4

PM, please feel free to stop in or call if you by requiring any assistance.

LANDS

My name is Sonia Gardypie and I'm the Lands Manager for MGBHLMFN. My certification is from both the University of Saskatchewan with the Kanawayihteytan Askiy (keeping the land)

Program and from National Aboriginal Land Manager Association (NALMA) national training. I came to MGBHLM last May 2023 as a contractor and full time in July 2023. My main objective as the Lands Manager is to ensure all permits and payments are updated and to provide The Nation the opportunity to have a Lands Management Policy, Land Use Plan and an Environmental Management Plan. I also manage the Buffalo Coordinator and worker with the Elk Island Buffalo on reserve and the upcoming Yellowstone Buffalo coming in January 2025.

LAND USE PLANNING – Our Land Use Planning project is underway, and the University of Saskatchewan & National Aboriginal Land Managers Association (NALMA) are both excited to be part of our endeavor. NALMA has provided funding for the nation to create a Land Use Plan for future needs.

CONTAMINATED SITES PROJECT – ISC has provided funding for the purpose of identifying and testing the soil of the contaminated sits of the nation. So far, the results obtained will be tested and the purpose of this project is to ensure our Waste Transfer Station goal is supported and prepared for use in the year to come.

BUFFALO (ELK, YELLOWSTONE) – The Elk Island Bison are attracting neighbors for tours, and we are currently working on a safety waiver for future tours. We have 6 new calves born this past spring and now that our bison are going on 2 years since they've arrived in February, we will expect more calves to be born this spring.

The Yellowstone bison from Fort Peck Montana will arrive by January 2025. The fencing is completed and the final equipment needed for the bison will be completed before snowfall.

JOB POSTINGS – there will be jobs posted for our lands department is expanding and new projects are on the way. Please look out for postings as Lands Coordinator, GIS/Mapping Technician, Land Use Planning Trainee.

Gun safety course 3x throughout the year of 2024. We were able to educate the members about gun safety and licensing.

Hunting & Skinning: September 8th – 9th 2024, provided women the opportunity on the process of skinning and meat processing.

Adult bingo ages 18-54. Prevention hosted a free bingo event with a total of 59 adult members in attendance. Elders social: November 14th 2024. Will be collaborating with Language committee to provide a social event focusing on the well-being of the Elders.

Traditional parenting program: July 3rd 2024 – August 3rd 2024. Program focused on providing parents with knowledge of cultural and traditional values and parenting skills.

October 27th/28th certificated 24 MGBHLMN Youths in the Ride Rite Safety Training & Certification course held at the MGBHLM School, as well we distributed helmets for youths that attend & passed the course.

Currently every Sunday we started the soccer program with collaboration with the Soccer Tribal Academy every weekend at Nation West Field House. We focus on MGBHLM Members ages 7-14 and the next Sunday being age 17+ & adults focusing on early development & movement for the body as we focus on training all winter to improve in our off season.


