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Community Update - Message from Councillor Celest Sanders

Tansi, Hello to all our community members,

I hope this message finds you and your families well. As summer comes to a close, I hope the plans and dreams you've been working on are taking shape, and that your home fires are burning strong as we move together into the fall and winter seasons.

Our Nation has been busy, and I'd like to share some important updates and plans for the future.

Community Improvements & Safety

- Solar Lights: Recently installed along the west side and one townsite. More lights will be added to the south road, the second townsite, and around the skate park. We are also finalizing a subscription plan to install cameras for added safety.
- Road Dust Control: We are working with a company to apply treatment in the spring to reduce dust. O&M will also place gravel in muddy areas before the spring thaw.
- Speed Bumps: Installed to protect our youth, especially near the skate park and arcade. Please slow down and drive safely instead of going around them.

Fire Hall Update

The final venting system has been installed, and cleanup and interior preparation are now underway. We expect the building to be completed by **October 20th**, with a grand opening later in the month. This marks a major step forward in strengthening community safety.

Skate Park & Pump Track

The new park will be ready in just a few weeks! We're planning a grand opening that will include pro demonstrations, giveaways for kids, and a community BBQ. This has been an exciting project, and it's been a pleasure working with the company that helped make it a reality.

School Track Repairs

The company responsible has acknowledged the uneven, thin surface and will completely redo the track in **May**, finishing and painting it all at once.

Elections & Project Timelines

With elections approaching, some projects may be paused between late September and mid-November. This is normal, and while we expect only short delays, we truly appreciate everyone's patience during this time.

Future Growth

- Walking paths will begin after subdivision work is complete, to avoid damage from heavy equipment.
- Renovation and expansion of the community hall to support gatherings and events.
- Relocation and expansion of the arcade into the building behind the hall.
- Addition of a gym and dance space for fitness and traditional practices.

It's amazing to see how far our Nation has come. I remember when only a few vehicles were parked outside the band office — today, the lot is full, with staff also working at The Ridge. Our growth continues, and together, we're building a stronger future.

Travel Club - Third Trip

Planning is underway for our third Travel Club trip, set for **2027**. While the break has been longer this time due to elections and other priorities, preparations will begin in 2026, including fundraising. Destination to be determined!

This moment is truly historic — the first of its kind in Canada — as the Yellowstone Buffalo have returned to our Nation as a sacred, nation-to-nation gift from the Fort Peck Reservation in Montana, USA.

Their presence restores not only the powerful genetics of the Yellowstone Bison, but also a spiritual bond to Turtle Island that has existed since the beginning of time.

For six months they waited in quarantine, protected and cared for, until at last in July 2025 the gates opened. They stepped onto their new home — 217 acres of open pasture — and with every hoofprint upon the earth, they brought back life, strength, and hope.

Once more, our lands are graced by their spirit, and once more, we walk alongside them as relatives in this sacred journey of renewal.

MOSQUITO GRIZZLY BEAR'S HEAD LEAN MAN FIRST NATION

It is an exciting time for Mosquito Grizzly Bear's Head Lean Man (MGBHLM) First Nation as we move closer to the grand opening of our new Interpretive Centre, located on our land at The Ridge, just south of Battleford.

Chief Tanya Aguilar-Antiman recently received the keys to the new facility, marking a proud milestone for our Nation. The official grand opening is planned for September 30th.

"I am incredibly proud of all the people who contributed to this facility—from those who first brought the idea forward, to those who pushed it forward on paper, and to those who worked tirelessly with government to make it a reality," said Chief Aguilar-Antiman. "It was a huge undertaking, and it showed the strength of our Nation working together. There were a total of 29 project meetings to bring this vision to life, from project management right through to completion."

The two-story 15,000-square-foot building stands as a symbol of resilience, vision, and collaboration.

The project represents an investment of more than \$6 million. Funding included \$5.8 million from provincial and federal grants, with the Nation contributing nearly \$950,000 of its own resources.

This new Centre will serve as a cornerstone for culture, education, and community pride—honouring our past while building a stronger future for generations to come.

INCOME ASSISTANCE

Cheques are issued on the first of everything except when the 1st falls on a weekend and cheques are issued on the Friday prior to the 1st of the month.

We have 240 clients with 63 special need requests processed and 11 Level of Care clients.

During the first and second quarters, Income Assistance provided 250 cleaning kits during Treaty Day and for the Information blitz on September 17, we will hand out 250 bedding packages which will include sheets, pillowcases and a quilt.

ABE discussions were held with Education – there will be more information on Sept 17 at the Information Blitz and Education will have an Assessment Day on Sept 18 at the hall.

ASSISTED LIVING HOME CARE – these clients are in Long-term care as they need a higher level of care that they cannot get at home. We have 5 clients living

<u>SERVICE DELIVERY</u> – in the social department we have Amanda Gopher as the Income Assistance (IA) Administrator, Tristan Moosomin is the IA Assistant, Loralee IA Finance Clerk.

<u>Home-to-Work</u> employed 45 clients for the pow-wow on July 4-6/25 and on 10 clients worked Treaty Day July 8/25. This program assists income assistance clients make a small income to meet basic needs.

IAFNYES

- The Yakikiw Readiness program was running from February 3 completed April 17
- Miskasowin Information session was June 9 with program start date of June 24 completed August 29
- Currently we have nine youth employed with the Nation
- The intent of this program is to get the 18–30-year-olds off welfare. The goal is to build capacity in our membership so they can be employable in and off the nation to help them become independent.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION (CDC) – This program has helped to fund the Gospel Service held in March of 2025, and the Grad Gala on June 12/25.

BAND MEMBER ASSISTANCE – Aiyana Morin is the Community Intake Worker. She receives all intake calls and reviews the application, asks a series of questions so she can refer them to the

department necessary to take your requests. You can be referred to Income Assistance, Jordon's Principle, Prevention or Band Member Assistance. Band member Assistance is meant to support immediate families in a life/death situation.

There have been ?? applications with ?? referred to Prevention, ?? referred to Jordan's Principle.

SITAG/LFD – Saskatchewan Indian Training Assessment Group Inc (SITAG) required documents when applying for support are an employment letter, acceptance letter or proof of attendance. The Program helps clients secure employment and job start-up items, or support train needs.

MGBHLMFN Public Works Department

2025 Report

The MGBHLMFN Public Works Department is committed to providing employees, community members, and leadership with safe, value-added, and productive services.

Safety is a shared responsibility between management, employees, contractors, subcontractors, and regulatory agencies. All employees of the MGBHLMFN Public Works Department are accountable for occupational health and safety.

We ensure our employees have the training, equipment, technology, and procedures needed to proactively manage workplace hazards.

Highlights of 2025

This spring and summer were busy as we prepared for community events and ongoing projects.

New Equipment & Projects

- Acquired a new garbage truck with a side-mount loading system and distributed durable black plastic garbage bins to all households.
- Added a new fire truck to the fleet, alongside the existing fire truck, strengthening emergency response capacity.
- Began construction of the new Waste Transfer Station in partnership with ISC.
 Once completed, the current transfer site will be decommissioned.
- Upcoming Fire Hall project scheduled to begin by the end of October 2025.

Community Preparation & Maintenance

- Built a new road and cleared grounds for the Sundance site.
- Completed grass cutting and road maintenance at the Pow Wow grounds.
- Provided graveyard preparation and ongoing maintenance for community services.
- Performed grass cutting, ditch mowing, and garbage pickup across community buildings and public spaces.
- · Continued upkeep of the sports grounds with grass maintenance.

Waste Management

- · Distributed black garbage bins to every household.
- Scheduled removal of old wooden garbage bins, which will be transported to the dump.
- Waste Transfer Station approval process is nearly complete.

WHAT IS A LANGUAGE NEST?

It is a program where the children learn in an environment where language acquisition happens naturally. A language <u>nest</u> would incorporate culture into all aspects of the program. This is a method that has been identified, by the <u>Maori people</u>, as the most effective in language revitalization. We invite you to please join us in developing learning resources by sharing your stories for <u>our young</u> people to enjoy!

Here are some areas

maskihkiy - pežúda - medicine

Language continues to explore plants on our nation to research whether the plants are native to the land or if they were brought from another country, we continue to interview knowledge keepers on the names of the plants in our languages. Their stories of medicine uses have been a rewarding journey. Your stories on how your family used different plants can also be documented, please share.

Exploring Language Resources

Things to keep in mind when thinking of purchasing language resources. Cree language consists of 5 dialects across Canada, and each community has their own slang. Nakota, Dakota, and Lakota also have their own dialects and slangs. It is important to evaluate each resource so that it can be useful in our community.

Traditional Foods

With the traditional food harvesting, preparation, preservation and eating has been a huge learning experience. The opportunity to learn as we go is exciting while enjoying the wonderful taste of cooking over the fire which adds so much flavor.

Some of the other areas being developed are:

- Creating a digital photo database
- Community mapping
- Community scan
- Researching traditional names of places in and around our area
- Explore traditional Maternal child health

Lands & Resources Community Update:

Tansi Nitohtemtihk (Greetings)

As the Land department grows in staff it also grows in duties for the nation. It has been a very busy year, and I would like to share some ongoing projects we have been working on this year.

Land Use Planning:

The lands team is working with the UofS to create the Land Use Plan, which will assist any upcoming projects on the land. This opportunity creates a road map of opportunity to place buildings, homes, and any projects in an orderly fashion to prevent any future mishaps, especially when it comes to soil or flood complications. This also assists in the mapping area, so we can organize the different projects with no overlaps or intrusion into traditional areas. We have maps available in our land office if there is interest in studying or observing the information. Our Land Use Planning is in the Category 2 stage and is ongoing.

Lands Policy:

Our Lands Management Policy is still in the review process and will be up for leadership review pertaining to the Agriculture and Grazing permits. This will be ongoing in all areas of land management and will be updating membership as we go along.

Pasture Management Preparations:

At the beginning of May, we begin our intake of cattle for grazing purposes. Outside farmers who rent land from the band bring in their cattle, and this goes on till the beginning of October. We are near the end of this grazing period, and soon the outside cattle will be picked up.

Yellowstone Release from quarantine:

At the end of July was the release of the Yellowstone herd was released from quarantine to their pasture. This was an event that was shared with the community members and a few from other nations. An event to be remembered as they are finally free to roam the vast open pasture.

Contaminated Sites Project Update:

There will be a team continuing the testing for our landfills and will be following up with any concerns; however, there are no concerns at this time. Currently, we are in Phase 3 of this project, which includes the steps needed to move on with our future Waste Transfer Station. I will update as time goes on with this process.

Additions to Reserve Update:

The purchase of the Post Office building on 100th Street in North Battleford is almost complete as the lands have completed the process of turning this property into reserve land. The land the building is on and two parking spaces beside it will be officially MGBHLM urban reserve land by the end of this fall.



Buffalo Keystone Connections Event:

On August 19-21, we hosted the Buffalo Keystone Connections event. The event was joined by other nations that are interested in Buffalo and organizations that work with Buffalo and land projects. IBRI (International Buffalo Relations Institute), UofS, and SAGE (Soil and Agro Ecosystem Project). They were honoured with the presence of Elders and community members at the two evening presentations. They were very amazed and taken aback by the opportunity to come to the community and view and study the land and buffalo locations. I'm attaching links to their organizations in case there is interest in reading up on them.

KA Program Update:

3 band members who have been registered in the land management program at the UofS are still in progress, and one has completed their first year. Congratulations to Jobina Keskotagan on completing her first year of the KA program at the UofS.
